Your Input Received!

In August, KBVE conducted a survey about controlled substance reporting requirements as proposed by the Office of Inspector General (OIG) and the Controlled Substances Prescribing Council (CSPC). More than 200 licensees shared their thoughts in response to the survey. Thank you to everyone for providing this critical feedback! KBVE was in turn able to share these anonymized responses with legislators, several of whom share your concerns and wish to support Kentucky's veterinary community.

Key survey responses:

- Only 19% of respondents felt they could comply with reporting requirements for dispensation of controlled substances in less than 24 hours, as is proposed by OIG/CSPC.
- 27% indicated they would not be able to comply even within 72 hours.
- More than 30% of respondents indicated they would need to hire additional staff, with a full 8% indicating they would need to purchase new computer systems.

When asked how reporting controlled substance dispensation would change their practice, respondents indicated:

- 45% would obtain whatever resources were needed to comply.
- 30% indicated they would stop dispensing controlled substances.
- 8% indicated they would stop prescribing controlled substances, even if it was in the best interest of the patient.
- 7% indicated they would close their doors/stop practicing.

KBVE has issued a letter of concern to OIG and the CSPC. This is an evolving situation, and one both KBVE and KVMA are monitoring closely. The Board understands that a regulatory change would be required to implement reporting requirements. Stay tuned for more information -- KBVE will keep licensees posted on critical updates.

Did You Know?

New veterinarian graduates who have passed their NAVLE <u>must</u> be licensed to work in the Commonwealth. There is no provision in the Kentucky Practice Act by which these individuals may practice under the supervision of a licensed veterinarian without a license of their own. If you are planning to hire or have recently hired a new graduate, ensure they are licensed before they begin work.

Grievance Case Spotlight

KBVE Agency Grievance # 2021-50

Case Details:

- November 2021 The complainant took three cats to be spayed and neutered. One cat had a reaction to the anesthesia and the procedure was stopped before it was started. A second cat cat died following surgery before full recovery. The third cat was neutered without incident. Consent forms were signed for blood testing on only one patient, but the complainant alleged the veterinarian tested all three cats. Additionally, when providing news of the patient passing, the veterinarian allegedly admitted that other patients in her care that day had issues with the anesthesia.
- December 2021 Initial letters were mailed to the respondent.
- January 2022 A response was received by the Board. Members of the Grievance Committee reviewed the response at their next meeting and ordered an investigation.
- March 2022 An investigative report was submitted to the Grievance Committee. The report outlined the standard protocols used with all patients in the high volume spay/neuter operation. All three cats were given a complete physical exam prior to sedation. The owner did not consent to bloodwork, only a FELV/FIV test on the youngest patient. After prep, the first cat was intubated but had low oxygen. After 5-10 minutes of assisted breathing, yohimbine was administered to reverse the xylazine and the cat recovered. The second cat was given ketamine and acepromazine IV, then masked with isoflurane. The surgery was successful and the O2 never dropped. The third cat was prepped, surgery completed, and was moved to recovery. Monitors were left on post-surgery until the patients began to move. After monitors were removed, the third cat was placed in a cage to finish recovering. A few minutes later the second cat was discovered with blue gums and deceased. Three support staff were in the room with line-of-sight on the recovery area at all times. It was unclear why the second cat passed away when the surgery went smoothly. Pre-op bloodwork may have revealed additional information.
- April 2022 The Board issued a dismissal letter, as no violation of the Kentucky Veterinary Medicine Practice Act could be identified. However, Members of the Committee cited that the use of xylazine in felines as an anesthetic protocol was inappropriate and advised the veterinarian to engage in further study on current medical trends in feline sedation.

Start to Finish: This case spanned 6 months.

General Cautions: Newer and more selective alpha-2 agonists are now more commonly used in small animal veterinary medicine. If used, xylazine is typically part of an anesthetic combination and should be reversed post surgery. In felines, sedation with xylazine without a reversing agent carries a high risk of severe and lasting harm, including chronic cardiovascular, respiratory, and neurological complications. A reversal agent, such as yohimbine or atipamezole, is crucial for mitigating adverse effects and ensuring a safe recovery.

This spotlight is part of our effort to illustrate the Board's role in maintaining professionalism and protecting the public interest.


KBVE Legislative Activities

In August, the KBVE filed amendments to the Allied Animal Health Professional (AAHP) regulations to incorporate newly mandated licensure for equine dental providers (EDPs). The regulations are available on the KBVE website Practice Act page under the heading "Regulations – Filed with LRC (proceeding through administrative rule making process)". The public comment period is open until October 31. Comments may be mailed to the Board or emailed to Michelle.Shane@ky.gov.
